Notes on the Gospel

In 1994, a previously unpublished document from the Dead Sea Scrolls saw the light of day. The Halakhic Scroll Discussed many points of the Law. However, this scroll forced many Christian scholars to reassess their view of Palestinian culture in the time of Jesus. Up to this point, that view was informed by Josephus, the Jewish historian to the Roman world in the first century AD. Josephus described Jewish life before the fall of Jerusalem in terms the Greco-Roman culture could understand. But, the minutia found in this Scroll and how that minutia divided the Essences from the Pharisees and the Sadducees forced many scholars to see different schools of thought in Palestine, not in the philosophic terms Josephus presented, but in terms of how the Torah was applied to everyday life. This shift to Torah application (Halakhic study) marked a new page in Gospel studies. The early Jesus movement (especially seen in Matthew's gospel) marked their differences from Pharisee and Sadducee not only in a devotion to Jesus from Nazareth, but also in how the Law was applied to the community. Jesus was not only Lord and Savior; he was also the Teacher of the Law.

Do not think I came to undo the Law and the Prophets. I came not to undo but fulfill. Until heaven and earth pass away, one iota or one dot will not ever pass away from the Law until all (things) might come about. Whoever undoes one of the least of these commands, will be called least in the kingdom of heaven. For I say to you that if you do not greatly exceed the righteousness of the scribes and the Pharisees, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven.

"I came to fulfill - show everyone the right way to live out the Law and fill in the Law and its meaning. Jesus exclaimed he came to fulfill the Law and the Prophets. Jesus was the primary example of a moral life AND he was the primary teacher of the Law. He expected the leadership of the Christian community to follow in his footsteps as examples and teachers of the Law.

As this Teacher figure, Jesus would be the touchstone for interpretation the Christian community would follow. Those who were faithful to his interpretation would be "great in the Kingdom," while those who gave a loose interpretation would be "least in the Kingdom." It is interesting to note that both the faithful and loose teacher were saved, while the Pharisees were implicitly not saved. Jesus implied that the Pharisees' interpretation of the Law was illegitimate.

Jesus was concerned how breaking the commandment affected one's relationship with God. Jesus used extreme language to make his point. Jesus addressed how one could keep the commandment in its purest form. He sought to teach the purest notion of the Law. Such purity was meant to lead the adherent into a fuller relationship with God. These interpretations were idealistic, so they were meant as goal to reach.

In today's Gospel, Jesus was instructing his disciples about how to live the new Law - the law of love – as He announced the presence of the Kingdom of God. In His teaching, nothing substantial changes: there is no fundamental difference between the former Law and the new Law. What does change is the manner of practicing the Law:

Chinese churches closed in response to coronavirus

With the infection rate continuing to grow, the World Health Organization declared a global health emergency last Thursday.

Newman relic stolen

The only surviving piece of bone thought to belong to St John Henry Newman has been stolen from the Birmingham Oratory in England. The Oratory announced the theft in its weekly

newsletter yesterday, saying the bone fragment had been taken from its casket in the Newman Shrine. The fathers appealed for anyone who had seen any suspicious activity to come forward. St John Henry Newman was buried in a cemetery in Rednal, outside Birmingham, in 1890. His grave was excavated in October 2008, but other than the small fragment of bone, no physical remains were found save for brass coffin handles and an inscription plate. A spokesman said at the time that given the damp nature of the soil, total decomposition was not surprising.

The incident is the latest in a spate of relic thefts around the world in recent years. In 2012, the heart of St Laurence O'Toole was stolen from Christ Church Cathedral in Dublin. It was discovered in a park six years later. In 2017, Italian police recovered a piece of St John Bosco's brain that had been hidden in a teapot. They said that the thief had "erroneously" believed the gold-painted reliquary over the glass jar was worth a lot of money.

Dear Parishioners,

Cardinal Robert Sarah, not long ago, found himself standing amid the ruins of the Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris. The wreckage of the place reminded him, he said, of the state of the Church in the West, which, in order to rebuild, we have got first to overcome our fear and inhibition about telling the truth of God and ourselves in relation to Him.

"The spires of the human spirit," as he calls them, have become like the cathedral itself - "shattered and broken." "You want to rebuild the Church?" he asks. "Then you must get down on your knees!" Only God can save us now. Adoration is how it is done. "You want to rebuild this beautiful cathedral that is the Catholic Church?" he asks again. "Get on your knees! A cathedral," he continues, "is first of all a place where men can kneel ... where God is present in the Most Holy Sacrament. The most urgent task (therefore) is to recover a sense of adoration!" The absence of which, he insists, "is the source of all the fires and crises that are rocking the world and the Church."

The Church does not need more structures or more programs. What she needs are mystics, saints, men and women who have fallen in love with God. Sanctity is the solution - those who long to become holy.

To experience the grace of Jesus Christ, it is never enough to remain on the outside looking in. The event of Christ will never reveal itself to those who refuse to enter into the heart of the mystery. The Church can only reveal herself to those who venture inside, seeing her exactly in the mystery of God's presence. Entering through the church door, seeing it all, and struck by the power of God's presence. The Church is the only thing that is going to make the world a better place. The Church will always endure – because the Church is the Body of Christ and on this body we are fed." Christ gave us a Church to lead us by the hand to eternal life.

Kidnappers murder Nigerian seminarian

One of four Nigerian seminarians kidnapped last month has been killed by his abductors, a Nigerian bishop announced on Saturday.

The three seminarians kidnapped along with Michael Nnadi, 18, were released in the weeks following their kidnapping. "With a very heavy heart, I wish to inform you that our dear son, Michael, was murdered by the bandits on a date we cannot confirm. He and the wife of a doctor were arbitrarily separated from the group and killed. The Rector identified the corpse this afternoon," Sokoto Bishop Matthew Hassan Kukah said in a statement released on Saturday.

Mr. Nnadi was taken by gunmen from Good Shepherd Seminary in Kaduna on January 8. The gunmen, disguised in military camouflage, broke through the fence surrounding the seminarians' living quarters and began shooting sporadically. They stole laptops and phones before kidnapping four young men.

Pope Francis: The world needs Catholics who go out, proclaim Jesus

Pope Francis spoke last Sunday Catholics to be active in going out Jesus Christ to the world.

Francis praises St John Paul II in new book

St. John Paul II taught the world that truly great faith and holiness dwell in "the normality of a person who lives in profound communion with Christ", Pope Francis says in a new book. Precisely because he allowed people to see he was a human being — whether skiing or praying, hiking or suffering — "every gesture of his, every word, every choice he made always had a much deeper value and left a mark," Pope Francis wrote. Much of the book is biographical information about the late Pope, but each chapter includes Pope Francis' response to questions about his relationship with the late Pope and observations about St John Paul's spirituality, personality, events in his life and his teaching.

Pope turns 19th-century palace into homeless shelter A 19th-

century palace in prime position in the center of the Vatican has been converted into a homeless shelter on Pope Francis' orders. Palazzo Migliori, which was constructed in the early 1800s, served as the headquarters of the all-female Calasanziane religious order, which used the building to care for young single mothers. After occupying the building for 70 years, the order relocated to new premises last year and the palace was renovated, leading to questions about how it would be used. Sitting on prime real estate just off St Peter's Square, the building could have generated significant income for the Church as a luxury hotel, but Pope Francis had other intentions.

Pope Francis personally directed his almoner, Cardinal Konrad Krajewski (his officer in charge of distributing services to the poor), to convert it into a homeless shelter. The four-storey building will house around 50 men and women, although the 16-bedroom facility has capacity for more during cold winter temperatures, Cardinal Krajewski said.

The lower levels will be used to provide social support to the occupants, including computing, reading, recreation, and psychological counselling. Volunteers can also use the building to prepare meals for homeless people who were sheltering elsewhere. Cardinal Krajewski said the Vatican requested the construction company in charge of renovating the building employ homeless people during the overhaul. "The important thing is that here we are in front of the Vatican, within the heart of the Pope, the poor have a home in front of the Pope," he said.

Why Catholics venerate the remains of the dead



The cherishing of relics, whether first, second or third class, is one

of the practices of the Catholic Church that has been handed on from the beginning. Of themselves, relics are the remains of a holy person, a saint, and, on account of their connection to that holy person, they are revered.

The veneration of the remains of saints move us to remember that saint, and in some cases it can

even encourage us to live according to higher values – to their values. The relics of saints are physical remains which connect us with the goodness and holiness of the saint. They remind us of the saint and, through the saint, move us to live better lives. Relics are a reminder that "holiness and goodness can be lived and achieved.

In the altar of our Basilica are the relics of each one of the Apostles, a relic of Saint John Paul II, Saint Teresa of Calcutta, Saint John Vianney and Blessed Solanus Casey. Each of the relics is a small piece of the bone.

Lighthouses, an ancient symbol of Christianity



Solitary towers at the edge of a harbor are not a recent invention. The Egyptians were known for the Pharos of Alexandria, one of the tallest structures in the ancient world. On the top of the tower was a bonfire that helped ships navigate the port at Alexandria. It is believed that this lighthouse became the prototype for all other lighthouses after it.

It should not be surprising that this became a symbol of Jesus, Christianity and the Church. Jesus said in the Gospel of John, "I am the light of the world; he who follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" (John 8:12). This passage can then be connected to the traditional image of the Church as a ship, making Jesus the light on the lighthouse, guiding the Church (and the pilgrim soul) to the Eternal Shores of Heaven.

Ships in art: Symbols of the Church and our pilgrimage to heaven. At the same time, while it is true that Jesus is the "light of the world," Jesus also referred to his disciples using that same term.

You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hid. Nor do men light a lamp and put it under a bushel, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. (Matthew 5:14).

This particular passage reflects a similar concept to a lighthouse and explains how Christians (and the Church) are meant to be a light for all to see. As Christians we are filled with the light of Christ at baptism and are sent forth with the task of bringing that light into the world, helping other souls reach the destination for which we are all created.

The lighthouse is a beautiful image, one that has always given comfort to the Christian soul trying to navigate the sea of life in order to reach the Eternal Harbor.

HAPPINESS & PEACE

Are you happy? How many times have you been asked that question? If you say "Yes," you might not exactly be telling the truth. If you say "No," you will have to answer the follow-up question, "Why not?"

To answer the question, we have to know what the person asking the question means by happiness. Some people think that happiness is having fun, and feeling good all the time. Some people think that happiness is having an endless supply of money. Some people think that happiness is having good health, or being good looking. We all have our own opinions of what will make us happy. But deep down in our hearts, we suspect that none of these things will make us happy; in fact, the world is not capable of making us happy. We were made in such a way that nothing created can make us fully satisfy us. Oh, we can find happiness here and there, but it always ends - it never stays as long as we want it.

Jesus came to give us what we can't find here. He refers to that happiness when He says, "Peace." <u>"Peace is my farewell gift to you,"</u> Jesus told His disciples, <u>"my peace is my gift to you. I do not give it to you as the world gives peace."</u>

The peace of Jesus is a positive, powerful, life-giving force. It moves into every human situation, bringing healing, bringing peace of mind and heart and soul. The peace of Jesus Christ is a gift which takes away all fear, doubt and insecurity, and fills the person with hope, trust and confidence in facing the challenges of living according to the Gospel.
