THE SECOND SUNDAY IN LENT

Peter declared Jesus was the Messiah. Six days later, Jesus led Peter, James, and James' brother John up a mountain, so they could be alone. There, Jesus changed right in front of them. His face shined like the sun. And his clothes were as white as sunlight. Suddenly, the three followers saw Moses and Elijah talking with Jesus. Peter spoke up, "Lord! We're lucky to be here! If you want, I'll pitch three tents:

one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah."

While Peter was speaking, a light-filled cloud suddenly covered them. Suddenly, a voice spoke from the cloud, saying: "This is my Beloved Son, in Whom I am well pleased. Listen to Him." When they heard the voice, the three followers were so afraid, they fell down and put their faces on the ground. Jesus came up and touched them. "Don't be afraid. Get up!" Jesus said. When they looked up, they didn't see anyone else but Jesus. As they climbed down the mountain, Jesus gave them an order. "Don't tell anyone what you saw until God raises the Son of Man from the dead."

The three events Matthew emphasized were 1) the appearance of Moses and Elijah with Jesus, 2) the bright cloud, and 3) the voice from the cloud. Each "Look!" signaled a point of revelation.

Jesus took three of his first disciples he called (and his closest friends) up to the mountain top. In Matthew's gospel, the mountain symbolized key moments in the life of Jesus. Jesus was tempted on a mountain (Matt. 4:1-11). He proclaimed the core of his teaching (the Beatitudes sermon) from a mount (Matt. 5:1-7:29). He prayed to the Father on high mountains (Matt. 14:23). He was betrayed by Judas on a mount (Matt. 26:30-56). A key moment on the mountain would change his relationship with these men.

The face of Jesus revealed the Father's glory as the Son. Jesus showed his disciples who the Father really was. The words Jesus spoke were the words of the Father. The love shown in the face of Jesus revealed the Father's love. Jesus and the Father were one because Jesus was truly the Father's Son. The voice from heaven affirmed Jesus as the revelation of the Father when it said: "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him."

Not only did the appearance of Jesus reveal the Father, the moment of glory revealed who the Father was. The God of Israel acted in the events of history. God intervened and changed the course of human history. The moment of transfiguration summed up all God has done to save His people. The Transfiguration revealed the Father acting through Jesus – the Messiah. Jesus calmed the fears of disciples, and brought them peace.

Dear Parishioners,

The Transfiguration was a moment of revelation, a grace-filled moment of clarity for the disciples. But it was only a moment along the journey of their lives.

God revealed Himself gradually to His people. God showed Himself through the majesty and beauty of his creation. In spite of humanity's sin and folly, God still revealed His care for all creatures. He made covenants with people like Noah and Abraham. He blessed His people with a leader, (Moses), a Law, and a Land. He sent judges to seek the right, kings to rule with honor, and prophets to return the lost. Along the way, there were divine moments of great clarity.

All of God's activity points to Jesus, for he sums up the totality of God's revelation. In Christ, we know the Father intimately. In Christ, we know His Word, His will, His purpose. In Christ, we know His love. Like the Transfiguration, we may see our life with the Father in Christ snap into focus. But, there will be other times away from the mountain, times of struggle and darkness, times of reflection and prayer. We need this time to fully realize so overwhelming a gift as the Father's grace.

Just as in our lives, so to the Church needs time to unfold the full value of God's revelation in Christ. The totality of revelation lies in the Church, but its significance has not been made fully explicit. While revelation ended with the death of the last apostle, the Church constantly realizes and proclaims anew what intimacy with the Father in Christ truly means. The Church proclaims Christ's transfiguration as it is transfigured by God's grace.

Transfiguration amazed Peter, James, and John. The amazement, however, led to fear of losing control and the peace that came with trusting God, not the entertaining awes of simple disbelief. The amazement helped change Jesus disciples from common fishermen to uncommon apostles. As Jesus reveals himself to us (as he did to the three disciples), He changes us. Revelation means losing control of a situation, only to be opened to new opportunities of grace. In small ways and large, Jesus constantly calls to us for a deeper walk with him.

Lenten Fast & Abstinence

Good Friday is an obligatory day of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. That means that from the age 18 until age 59, Catholics are obliged to follow these obligations. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Latin Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.

If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily his Resurrection.



STATIONS OF THE CROSS

The Stations of the Cross focus on events of Jesus' last day, beginning with His condemnation. At each station, the individual recalls and meditates on a specific event from Christ's last day. Specific prayers are recited, then the individual moves to the next

station until all 14 are complete.

The Stations of the Cross are celebrated in the basilica every Friday evening at 7:00 pm, and at Saint Henry Church on Sunday mornings of Lent at 9:00 am. – prior to the 9:30 am. Mass.

THE RITE OF ELECTION

This Sunday at 2:30pm. Bishop Monforton will celebrate the Rite of Election. The Rite is celebrated for Election of catechumens (adults, adolescents and children of catechetical age), and the Rite of Recognition of Baptized, but previously non-catechized Adults, Adolescents and Children preparing to Complete their Christian Initiation through the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Sponsors, godparents, priests, and Catechumenate parish team members will be present for the celebration. Prior to the celebration, a luncheon will be served.



THE RETURN BACK TO THE FATHER

The parable of "the prodigal son" teaches us that often, we distance ourselves from God and His Kingdom, and go off alone to "afar country." We waste the talents which God has given us. And we become spiritually impoverished; we begin to be in want. We were created for God's Kingdom, so we are not capable of being truly happy

and satisfied anywhere else. But we are afraid to turn to God, so we seek happiness and satisfaction from transitory things which can never satisfy us. Returning to God the Father in repentance will assure us of salvation. We must remember the heavenly city which is the goal of our pilgrimage.

SACRISTAN KILLED, PRIEST WOUNDED IN TERRORIST ATTACKS IN SPAIN

A sacristan was killed and a priest wounded during a suspected terrorist attack last week in two Catholic churches in Spain. According to police sources, the sacristan of the Church of Our Lady of La Palma was murdered and the pastor of St. Isidore Church was wounded. Both churches are in the city of Algeciras near the far southern end of the Iberian Peninsula across the strait of Gibraltar from Morocco.

In the St. Isidore attack, the suspect entered the church and struck at statues with a machete. The priest tried to expel him and once outside, the suspect stabbed the priest in the neck. The deceased sacristan was "much loved in the parish and in the city for his dedication and affability with everyone,"

In wake of the attacks, the mayor of Algeciras decreed a day of official mourning, with flags at half staff on municipal buildings.

The secretary general of the Spanish Bishops' Conference acknowledged that "in this case there was a religious motivation of hatred of the faith" but stressed that "we cannot and should not demonize groups in general." The prelate expressed in any case the "most absolute and total condemnation" of the attacks "with a special gravity", which is when this violence is wrongly tried to be justified in the name of God. That is taking the name of God in vain, whatever the name of that one true God may be called."

ST. BASIL THE GREAT ON FASTING:

"There is both a physical and a spiritual fast. In the physical fast the body abstains from food and drink. In the spiritual fast, the faster abstains from evil intentions, words and deeds. One who truly fasts abstains from anger, rage, malice, and vengeance. One who truly fasts abstains from idle and foul talk, empty rhetoric, slander, condemnation, flattery, lying and all manner of spiteful talk. In a word, a real faster is one who withdraws from all evil. As much as you subtract from the body, so much will you add to the strength of the soul. By fasting it is possible both to be delivered from future evils and to enjoy the good things to come."

Traditional Latin Mass attendees waiting to see impact of new Vatican restrictions



Catholics who attend the Traditional Latin Mass are awaiting the next steps from their bishops after the Vatican ordered the dioceses to get approval from the Holy See before they can authorize Latin Mass celebrations within parish churches.

Some bishops granted dispensations that allowed parishes to continue offering the Latin Mass as before. Even though many bishops believed they had this authority, the Vatican issued a clarification to *Traditionis custodes* to halt this approach. The

official clarification stated that any dispensation to use or erect a parish church for the celebration of the Traditional Latin Mass is "reserved in a special way to the Apostolic See," which means bishops alone cannot dispense these parishes. Bishops who issued dispensations without Vatican approval are to inform the Dicastery for Divine Worship, which will evaluate the individual cases.

Murder investigation underway in shooting death of LA Auxiliary Bishop



The shooting death of Los Angeles Auxiliary Bishop David G. O'Connell last Saturday was investigated as a homicide.

The shooting happened around 1 p.m. local time inside his home, the sheriff's department said.

The bishop was pronounced dead at the scene. O'Connell, 69, ministered to immigrants, the poor, and victims of gang violence for 45 years in the South Los Angeles area. Pope Francis made him a

bishop in 2015. O'Connell's friends and fellow bishops reacted with shock and sadness to the news of his death.

His housekeeper's husband was arrested in the murder case of Bishop David O'Connell. Charges were brought against a Hispanic male, 65-year-old Carlos Medina, the husband of O'Connell's housekeeper. Medina had previously done work at the bishop's residence. Detectives said that they were tipped off about the suspect, who was exhibiting "strange" and "irrational" behavior and had "made comments about the bishop owing him money.

The sheriff department's Special Enforcement Bureau personnel arrived at the scene with an amended warrant to search Medina's home and arrest him. Medina exited his home and surrendered to authorities without further incident.

Pipe Bomb Found Behind St. Dominic Catholic Church in Philadelphia



According to a police report, a passerby found the pipe bomb behind St. Dominic Catholic Church in the Holmesburg neighborhood of the city on Sunday.

The 18-inch pipe bomb was found behind the church in Philadelphia and removed by the police department's bomb squad.

The bomb squad removed the device and stated that the bomb was a PVC pipe with capped ends and a black powder on it, but that the type of powder was still unknown. The church, which was constructed in 1896, is one of the oldest in Philadelphia. Although the target of the pipe bomb is still unclear, there have been at least 248 incidents of arson, vandalism or other types of destruction against Catholic churches since May 2020. Criminal acts include churches being set on fire, statues being defaced with paint or having the limbs or the head cut off, gravestones defaced with swastikas, and defacing church buildings and property with anti-Catholic language.

THE QUESTION OF FUNERALS IN THE CHURCH

To have a funeral Mass in the Catholic Church, the deceased must be a Catholic who is in good standing with the church (one who practices the Faith and attends Mass)

The Order of Christian Funerals describes the church's ministry to the deceased and their family in these words: "At the death of a Christian, whose life of faith was begun in the waters of baptism and strengthened at the eucharistic table, the church intercedes on behalf of the deceased because of its confident belief that death is not the end of life, nor does it break the bonds forged in life. The church also ministers to the sorrowing and consoles them in the funeral rites with the comforting word of God and the sacrament of the eucharist. Christians celebrate the funeral rites to offer worship, praise, and thanksgiving to God for the gift of a life which has now been returned to God, the author of life and the hope of the just. The Mass, is the principal celebration of the Christian funeral.

A lector at a Catholic Funeral Mass must be a Catholic in good standing with the Church. To receive Communion at a Catholic funeral, the communicant must be a practicing member of the Catholic Church. Eulogies are never permitted during the celebration of a Catholic Funeral Mass.

The cremated remains of a body should be treated with the same respect given to the human body from which they came. This includes the use of a worthy vessel to contain the ashes. The cremated remains should be buried in a grave or entombed in a mausoleum or columbarium. The practice of scattering cremated remains on the sea, from the air, or on the ground, or keeping cremated remains in the home of a relative or friend of the deceased are not the reverent disposition that the Church requires.' The cremains must be buried or entombed.
