## THE THIRD SUNDAY IN LENT

Jesus came to a city in Samaria, called Sychar, near the (plot of) land which Jacob gave to his son, Joseph. The well of Jacob was there. So, Jesus sat down at the well. A woman from Samaria came to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give me water to drink." The Samaritan woman said to him, "How could You, a Jew ask from me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?" For Jews

do not share dishes with Samaritans. Jesus answered and said to her, "If you knew the gift of God and who said to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would ask him and He would have given you living water." She said to Him, "Sir, you have no pail and the well is deep. Where do you have living water? Jesus answered and said to her, "Anyone drinking of this water will thirst again, but whoever drinks from the water will never thirst again. The water I will give him will become a spring of water rising up into eternal life." The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, so I will not thirst again."

Jesus told her, "I am the Messiah!" For two days, Jesus stayed with the Samaritans, and many people trusted him because of what he said. In this short version of the woman at the well, Jesus used the symbolism of water to present the Spirit. In the process, He revealed himself to the woman. And she responded in faith.

The woman understood only in part. She desired eternal life, but only as a continuation of her present existence. She did not realize that the reception of God's gift required her to look to the giver. Here John answered the second question: Who is Jesus? Jesus said to her, "Trust me, woman, that the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. The hour is coming, and is now, when true worshipers will worship the Father in Spirit and truth. Jesus said to her, "I am the Messiah, the one speaking to you." He revealed Himself, so the believer could "know Him" (through experience). God's action was his saving activity, Jesus could say "salvation came from the Jews." "I AM" was one of John's titles for Jesus that could be woven into a discourse. It echoed the title God gave to himself on Mt. Sinai, "I AM WHO AM."

The Spirit was God's instrument of revelation. The Spirit sought believers to worship the Father. The Spirit empowered believers to worship the Father in Spirit and truth. In these two ways, the Spirit established a relationship between worshipers and the Father through revelation. Those who worship God can only do so through the Spirit. In other words, God the Spirit must live within the believer before he or she can truly worship God. The Spirit would be the inner dwelling spring of living water leaping up to eternal life. Only the Messiah could tell the woman "everything".

The Samaritans came to Jesus, and they believed because of His word. The woman came to faith along with others in the town. But, their faith ultimately did not rely on the witness of the woman. The people's direct experience with Jesus brought them to proclaim who he was and enjoy the gift he offered them.

Dear Parishioners,

The Diocese of Steubenville, Ohio, became the center of controversy last year, when Bishop Monforton announced to his priests in October that the diocese would be merged with the neighboring Diocese of Columbus,

Some Priests of the diocese pushed back on the plan, arguing that they had not been consulted, and eventually a planned USCCB vote on the prospective merger was scrapped. But the possibility that Steubenville will be merged into Columbus is still a live one, and the diocese is now facing an audit meant to gauge its financial viability.

Some of Steubenville's diocesan challenges are specific to its recent financial history. During the summer of 2020, both former diocesan comptroller David Franklin and former diocesan vicar general Monsignor Kurt Kemo admitted in court that they had embezzled large sums from the financially struggling diocese.

Our Diocese of Steubenville is a small diocese with a declining population, and limited resources. It faces demographic and financial challenges that a number of small dioceses in the Midwest and North-east will face in coming decades. Analysts have argued that the diocese is just too small to remain sustainable.

When the Catholic population of a region grows, dioceses need sometimes to split, if they become just too populous to be governed by a single bishop. In fact, the Diocese of Steubenville is the product of one such split — it was carved from the Diocese of Columbus in 1944. When those dioceses were split, both local churches were of relatively similar size, and both were growing. In 1950, the Steubenville diocese contained 62,000 Catholics, while the Columbus diocese contained 106,000. But since that time, the Diocese of Columbus has grown to almost 300,000 Catholics while the Diocese of Steubenville has shrunk to 30,000.

Steubenville is the fourth-smallest U.S. Latin diocese by population. And like many of the country's smallest dioceses, its Catholic population is falling rather than rising. The Catholic population of most dioceses in the Midwest and Northeast has shrunk over the last 30 years, while many of those in the South and West have grown. Declining Catholic population is not an indicator of poor pastoral care in the Steubenville diocese. Steubenville is a small city whose growth had once been fueled by the steel industry, but is now among the regions of Ohio with a shrinking population. Columbus, home to the state government and the third-largest university in the nation, is the fastest growing region of Ohio.

## The Stations of the Cross

Stations of the Cross focus on events of Jesus' last day, beginning with His condemnation. At each station, the individual recalls and meditates on a specific event from Christ's last day. Specific prayers are recited, then the individual moves to the next station until all 14 are complete.

The Stations of the Cross are celebrated in the basilica every Friday evening at 7:00 pm, and at Saint Henry Church on Sunday mornings of Lent at 9:00 am. – prior to the 9:30 am. Mass.

## **Today's Readings**

The readings of the Third Sunday of Lent, form a triduum along with those of the Fourth and Fifth Sundays, emphasizing the baptismal themes of Water (the woman at the well), Light (the healing of the man born blind), and Life (the raising of Lazarus). These powerful readings remind those preparing for baptism, as well as all the baptized.

- 1. Jesus offers his gift of life with no regard to the false barriers that society sets up between people. "Jews have nothing to do with Samaritans." Moreover, the disciples "were surprised to find him talking with a woman." Jesus breaks through these false barriers that society had set up.
- 2. This gift of life comes through the Death and Resurrection of Christ. The rock in the first reading represents Christ. As Paul relates to the Corinthians (see 1Cor.10:4), the tradition was that the rock continued to follow the Israelites on the journey, and that the rock was Christ. The rock was struck, just as Christ was struck and crucified, and water flowed from his side. The second reading also emphasizes his Passion, death, and resurrection as the source of this new life, "poured into our hearts" like the water poured out of the rock.
- 3. To accept the gift, repentance is required. The woman had to go find her husband first, repenting of her multiple unions.

Finally, accepting Christ necessarily means repentance and conversion.

# Rector reports more pilgrimages to Our Lady of Guadalupe Shrine than before pandemic



Monsignor Salvador Martínez, rector of the Guadalupe Basilica in Mexico City, noted that after two years of pandemic restrictions the Marian shrine "has resumed the impetus it had before and sometimes with greater strength. Many people have returned after having been isolated for a long time or having had to refrain from coming to the basilica. Some pilgrimages had to be suspended for two years, some for up to

three years. Now they have regained great strength, and are very well organized. "Martínez, who was appointed rector of the Guadalupe Basilica said, that the archbishop primate of Mexico, Cardinal Carlos Aguiar, pointed out that after the pandemic and with the reestablishment of activities, "we are really happy and also challenged since the reorganization of the basilica to respond as best as possible to the expectation of encountering the Blessed Virgin." In December 2022, with the reopening of the shrine to pilgrims, a historic figure of 12.5 million visitors was reached.

## Pope Francis' prayer intention for March

Pope Francis's prayer intention for the month of March is for victims of abuse. "In response to the cases of abuse, especially to those committed by members of the Church, it's not enough to ask for forgiveness. Asking for forgiveness is necessary but it is not enough," the Holy Father said. "Asking for forgiveness is good for the victims, but they are the ones who have to be at the center of everything," Pope Francis said.

"Their pain and their psychological wounds can begin to heal if they find answers — if there are concrete actions to repair the horrors they have suffered and to prevent them from happening again. The Church cannot try to hide the tragedy of abuse of any kind. Nor when the abuse takes place in families, in clubs, or in other types of institutions," the Holy Father added. Pope Francis said the Church must serve as a model "to help solve the issue and bring it to light in society and in families."

# 'Abortion Doula' at Notre Dame Speaker Series

In the wake of the Dobbs Supreme Court decision overturning the pro-abortion rights  $Roe\ v$ .  $Wade\ ruling$ , several bodies at the University of Notre Dame are hosting an event series dedicated to "reproductive justice." The series has attracted criticism for its decidedly pro-abortion slant.

While Easter is a moveable feast, St. Patrick's Day is always during Lent — and sometimes on a Friday. Like this year, for instance. Friday is also a day of abstinence for Catholics, especially during Lent.

More than three-quarters of the country's diocesan bishops — 80 have said yes to a dispensation; Bishop Monforton is one of those bishops; therefore, on Friday, March 17, we are dispensed from the obligation of not eating meat.

## Pope Francis mourns 'tragic' death of LA's Bishop David O'Connell

Archbishop José H. Gomez read a condolence message for Pope Francis at a memorial Mass for Bishop David O'Connell at St. John Vianney Church in Hacienda Heights March 1, 2023. In a telegram sent following the murder of Los Angeles Auxiliary Bishop David O'Connell last month, Pope Francis praised the late bishop's commitment to the poor and migrants, and offered his closeness to the local community.

In the telegram, signed by Vatican Secretary of State Cardinal Pietro Parolin, the pope said he was "deeply saddened to learn of the untimely and tragic death" of O'Connell, and offered his "heartfelt condolences and the assurance of his spiritual closeness to you, the clergy and religious and lay faithful" of the Archdiocese of Los Angeles.



Pope Francis voiced gratitude for O'Connell's many years of "devoted priestly and episcopal ministry to the church in Los Angeles, marked especially by his profound concern for the poor, immigrants, and those in need, his efforts to uphold the sanctity and dignity of God's gift of life and his zeal for fostering solidarity, cooperation, and peace within the local community."

Offering O'Connell's soul to God, the pope prayed that those who honor the bishop's memory would be reaffirmed in their resolve to "reject the ways of violence and overcome evil with good."

## West Virginia passes Religious Freedom Restoration Act

The West Virginia Legislature gave final approval last Tuesday to the Religious Freedom Restoration Act, which will now advance to the governor's desk to be signed into law.

The bill guarantees West Virginians' freedom from any state interference that may "substantially burden a person's right to exercise of religion." The act itself was created, Becket points out, after Oregon denied unemployment benefits to Native American counselors who were fired for using peyote in their religious ceremonies.

This is not a tool for discrimination, it is a shield to protect all people. The bottom line is, we shouldn't punish someone for practicing their religion unless there's a very good reason to do so.

## When the Miracle Doesn't Come

The absence of God's miracles does not signify the absence of his love. It's easy for us to read the Gospel accounts and see only the thread of one miracle story after another. But there are hidden golden threads that seem too often unnoticed, and it seems as if our Lord utters them in quiet desperation: "You seek me... because you ate your fill of the loaves," "Unless you see signs and wonders, you will not believe," and "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe."

The Lord tells us that His love is not measured simply in the physical, in the miracles and the healings, but perhaps even more so, in the absence of those. His love is shown, even more deeply, in the crosses, the trials and tempests of our lives, in the seeming absence of his power and love. That God permits sorrow and suffering for the very end of drawing us into himself, for an intimacy and sharing-in that could not be achieved any other way than through a share in his passion: "You seem, Lord, to give severe trials to those who love you, but only that in the excess of their trials, they may learn the greater excess of your love."

Many times, we hear, "Just sit back and wait and see what the Lord does!" as if a firework show awaits around every corner. St. Teresa of Ávila says, "They deceive themselves who believe that union with God consists in ecstasies or raptures, and in the enjoyment of Him. It consists in nothing except the surrender and subjection of our will – with our thoughts, words and actions – to the will of God."

The absence of God's miracles does not signify the absence of His love but the very presence of it, an offering of it and invitation to greater intimacy, a sharing in his life so efficaciously achieved by the stripping and fire of the cross.

God gives us this opportunity of love through the cross and sufferings, even more so than His miracles. As St. Thérèse of the Child Jesus prays, "O Lord, you do not like to make us suffer, but you know it is the only way to prepare us to know you as you know yourself, to prepare us to become like you... because you wish that my heart be wholly yours."

## Exclusive: Harrison Butker's advice on how to be a saint

Super Bowl-winning Kansas City Chiefs kicker Harrison Butker is a champion on the field and in the spiritual life, where he says he wants nothing less than to become a saint. "If we want to be saints, we have to die to ourselves," Butker said.

"I think that was our Blessed Mother asking for the spotlight to be shown on her and reminding me that all the glory goes to God and to her," Butker said. That kick sailed through the goal posts, clinching the game for the Chiefs. He said it's important for Catholics to be open about their faith in their jobs even if it makes them appear "weird" or "different. We can't be ashamed of our faith because, if we are Catholic, we know of all the fruits that Our Lord has given to us. And if we hoard those fruits, and we don't open up those fruits to those that are around us, especially in the workplace, where God wants us to evangelize, then I think we're doing a disservice to Our Lord. And we're not being charitable with our time in sharing the Gospel with those around us," he said. "But I always say God's will is better than my own will."
