FIFTEENTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR JULY 16, 2023

Jesus left the house to sit along the Sea of Galilee so he could teach the people. The contemporaries of Jesus gathered

around Him to learn about the Kingdom. The crowd was so great, that Jesus had to sit in a boat off shore to teach. But instead of teaching clearly, He taught in parables so that the listener (and the reader) could put the pieces together and grow spiritually.

"Listen!" Jesus said. "There was a farmer who threw seeds around to plant grain in his fields. As he threw the seeds around, some of them fell on the path where the farmer walked. The birds came and ate it up. Other seed fell on rocks only covered with a little soil. They quickly sprouted because the soil was so thin. When the sun came up, it dried the new plants out since they did not have long enough roots to get water. Other seeds fell on ground which also had thorn seedlings. The thorn plants grew so quickly and thickly, the grain seeds could not grow. But some seeds fell on good soil. And the seeds produced grain, one hundred times, sixty times, and thirty times more than what the farmer planted. Listen to what I say!"

The parable of the sower and the seed shocked Jesus' audience for wasteful planting and the abundant harvest. Ancient people saw waste as an abuse of the rich. Most ancient people agreed on two points. First, there was only a limited amount of wealth in the world. Second, God willed the distribution of that wealth within a rigid social class system. The rich (five percent of the population) held ninety percent of the wealth and the poor battled for survival.

Imagine the audience's attitude toward waste. They would recycle any useful object and pick up any useful seed so they could replant it in good soil. Yet the farmer in the parable threw seed around without thought. Did he flaunt his wealth? Or, did he totally lack common sense?

Jesus considered this parable important enough because He was emphasizing the blessings of God's Kingdom. God's blessings seemed as irrational to Jesus' audience. God blessed the wicked with riches while the good suffer. Yet the suffering of the good led to much greater blessings. Such was the Kingdom of God.

Jesus interpreted this parable for the missionary ministry of the apostles. He viewed the sower as the missionary preaching to the crowds. Some in the crowd reject the message outright. Others receive the message but are immature and quickly lose interest in the face of opposition. A third group become Christians but never enjoy spiritual growth, since worries of the world get in the way. The last group grows abundantly in Christ, since they willingly place themselves at risk (like seeds in a deep, rich soil that is turned over and over. Jesus meant his parables to shock His audience and make his audience think.

Dear Parishioners,

The whole world was created by the Word of God. Genesis shows God creating by speaking, and John's Gospel points out in the first chapter that this Word that God spoke in the beginning was in fact Christ. Paul expounds the same truth in the first chapter of Colossians, which in fact contains a commentary on the first verse of the Bible. Christ is that "beginning" of which Genesis speaks, and "all things were created by him and for him."

When, therefore, today's readings speak about the fruitfulness of the Word of God – Isaiah declaring that the word accomplishes the end for which it is sent, and Jesus explaining how the seed will bear fruit – they are not to be understood only in a spiritual sense. The fruitfulness of the Word is also physical, starting with human life itself. Mary said, "Be it done unto me according to your word," and by that word the physical conception of Christ took place.

When did God decide that you or the people around you should start to exist? The answer is, "From all eternity." There was never a time when God did not intend each living person to exist, nor when He did not have definitive plans for each person's life.

"My word will not return to me void." The plan, the eternal word, that God has for each person, is not to return void because of a veto on our part. Contraception, abortion, and euthanasia all constitute an offensive "No" to this Word, an attempt to veto an eternal decision of God regarding the fruitfulness of each life. Part of the reason for these "vetoes" is the "worldly anxiety" referred to in the Gospel. This anxiety leads to the temptation to cut off the fruitfulness of life.

Yet Paul, in the second reading, puts those anxieties in an eschatological perspective, inviting us to hold firm through life's difficulties and continue saying yes to God's plan.

Pope to visit Fátima to implore peace for Ukraine, entire world

On August 5, during his apostolic journey to Portugal on the occasion of World Youth Day, Pope Francis will lead the recitation of the Rosary at the Chapel of Apparitions of the Shrine of Our Lady of Fátima.

"The fact that he has decided to return to the feet of Our Lady of Fátima holds significance and reflects the Pope's intention to address the tragic war afflicting 'martyred Ukraine,' attacked by the Russian army, as well as the numerous forgotten conflicts around the world," said Andrea Tornielli, editorial director of the Vatican's Dicastery for Communication.

"This gesture by the Bishop of Rome can be directly linked to another significant act he made just over a month after the outbreak of war: the Consecration of Russia and Ukraine to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, celebrated in St. Peter's Basilica on 25 March 2022," Tornielli added.

Congressman renews request to visit bishop imprisoned in Nicaragua



U.S. Congressman Chris Smith (R-NJ) renewed his request to visit a Catholic bishop imprisoned by the Nicaragua's Daniel Ortega dictatorship, and demanded "the end of the persecution of the Catholic Church" in that country.

In a July 6 statement, Smith said he remains "very concerned about the safety and well-being of Bishop Rolando José Álvarez amid inconsistent reports of his status

in Nicaragua" and renewed his request to visit him there.

The congressman, who chairs the House Global Human Rights subcommittee, sent a letter to Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega last month requesting a meeting with Álvarez. Álvarez, who has been persecuted by the dictatorship of Ortega and his wife Vice President Rosario Murillo for years because of his defense of human rights, was finally prosecuted and sentenced February 10 for "treason against the homeland." In addition to being sentenced to more than 26 years in prison, Álvarez was permanently stripped of his citizenship and citizen rights.

On July 4, various human rights advocates stated that the dictatorship and representatives of the Catholic Church in Nicaragua held negotiations to allow the release and deportation of the prelate. The Nicaraguan news media reported the next day that the talks had failed and that Álvarez once again had been returned to his maximum security cell in the prison, known as "La Modelo," one of the oldest and most overcrowded prisons in the country where the regime's political prisoners are sent.

The auxiliary bishop of Managua, Silvio Báez, who has been living in exile in Miami since 2019 due to persecution from the Ortega dictatorship, tweeted July 5 that his brother in the episcopate would only agree to leave Nicaragua if "the Pope ordered him to" because "a pastor bishop doesn't go far away from his people because a dictatorship imposes it on him."

In his July 6 statement, Smith stressed that Álvarez " is a compassionate and honorable servant of God's people who continues to so bravely and selflessly advocate for other innocent victims who are also being persecuted by the brutal Ortega regime, including his brother priests who remain imprisoned." Previously, in a letter dated June 5, Smith asked Ortega to be allowed to visit Álvarez.

The congressman informed the Nicaraguan dictator that on March 22 he co-chaired "a congressional hearing that focused on the human rights situation in Nicaragua," noting that "compelling testimony by more than one expert witness highlighted Bishop Álvarez' unjust, ongoing imprisonment and prosecution."

Smith concluded his letter noting that he remains "gravely concerned about Bishop Álvarez' health and well being. Given the gravity of the reported abuses and credibility of recent testimony, as well as my responsibility for legislation and oversight of the US State Department on matters relating to internationally recognized human rights, it is important that I visit with him."

Cardinal Sarah: No synod can invent a 'female priesthood'



Cardinal Robert Sarah, prefect emeritus of the Dicastery for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, stressed that "the priesthood is unique" and warned that "no council, no synod" can "invent a female priesthood."

In his conference on the priesthood, entitled "Joyful Servants of the Gospel" given July 3 at the Conciliar Seminary in Mexico City, the cardinal assured that no one "has the power to transform this divine gift to adapt it and reduce its transcendent value to the cultural and environmental field."

"No council, no synod, no ecclesiastical authority has the power to invent a female priesthood ... without seriously damaging the perennial physiognomy of the priest, his sacramental identity, within the renewed ecclesiological vision of the Church, mystery, communion, and mission," he emphasized.

Sarah stressed that "the Catholic faith professes that the sacrament of Holy Orders, instituted by Christ the Lord, is one, it is identical for the universal Church. For Jesus, there is no African, German, Amazonia, or European priesthood. The priesthood is unique, it is identical for the universal Church."

In his conference, the prefect emeritus also reflected on "being a priest" and stressed that "the priesthood is a great, great mystery, so great a gift that it would be a sin to waste it. It's a divine gift that must be received, understood, and lived, and the Church has always sought to understand and enter deeper into the real and proper being of the priest, as a baptized man, called to be an alter Christus, another Christ, even more so an *ipse Christus*, Christ himself, to represent Him, to conform to Him, to be configured and mediated in Christ with priestly ordination," he explained.

For the Guinean prelate, "the priest is a man of God who is day and night in the presence of God to glorify him, to adore him. The priest is a man immolated in sacrifice to prolong the sacrifice of Christ for the salvation of the world." The cardinal said that the "first task" of priests "is to pray, because the priest is a man of prayer: He begins his day with the Office of Readings and ends his day with the Office."

"A priest who does not pray is about to die. A Church that does not pray is a dead Church," he warned. Regarding the lack of priestly vocations, he encouraged the faithful to pray because "it's not that we are few. Christ ordained 12 for the whole world. How many of us are priests today? There are close to 400,000 of us priests in the world. There are too many of us," he said, citing the same observation made by Pope Gregory the Great in the 7th century.

"Many have accepted the priesthood, but they're not doing the work of the priest," Sarah explained. "So in response, we must pray. Ask him to send workers to his harvest, pray. And show that we priests are happy, because if young men see that we are sad, we won't attract anyone." he urged. "We have to be happy, even if we're suffering."

Vatican releases schedule for Pope Francis's Mongolia visit in September

The Vatican released Pope Francis's four-day schedule for the first papal visit to Mongolia in September, where the pontiff will meet with government leaders, engage in interreligious dialogue and celebrate Mass for the country's small Catholic population.

Mongolia, a landlocked country situated between China and Russia, is home to about 1,300 Catholics, which is far less than 1% of the country's 3.3 million people. Despite the small population, Christianity in Mongolia dates back to the 7th or 8th century when Nestorians first visited the area. Catholic missionaries preached to Mongolians as early as the 13th century.

The logo used for the papal visit is an outline of Mongolia painted with the colors red and blue to mimic the flag of the country. It portrays a ger, a traditional Mongolian dwelling, with yellow smoke, which is the color of the Vatican. There is a cross to the right of the ger and the motto is written in Mongolian on both sides.

Pope Francis will depart from Rome on the evening of Thursday, Aug. 31, and arrive in Ulaanbaatar, the nation's capital, on the morning of Friday, Sept. 1. He will leave on Monday, Sept. 4.

Sept. 1

After departing from the Rome/Fiumicino International Airport at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 31, Pope Francis will arrive at the "Chinggis Khaan" International Airport in Ulaanbaatar at about 10 a.m. on Friday, Sept. 1. The pontiff will receive an official welcome when he arrives at the airport.

Sept. 2

On Saturday, Pope Francis will be greeted with a welcoming ceremony at Ulaanbaatar's Sukhbaatar Square at 9 a.m. At 9:30, the pope will make a courtesy visit to President Ukhnaagiin Khürelsükh in the state palace and at 10:20 meet with the authorities, civil society, and the diplomatic corps.

At 11 a.m., Pope Francis will briefly meet the chairman of the State Great Khural, which is the Mongolian parliament. He will then visit Prime Minister Oyun-Erdene Luvsannamsrai at 11:10. Later in the afternoon, the pontiff will meet with bishops, priests, missionaries, consecrated persons, and pastoral workers at Saints Peter and Paul Cathedral, the Apostolic See of the Prefecture of Ulaanbaatar.

Sept. 3

On Sunday morning, around 10 a.m., Pope Francis will take part in an ecumenical and interreligious meeting at Hun Theatre in Ulaanbaatar. The schedule did not disclose the other participants, but the majority religion of Mongolia is Buddhist. There are small Muslim and shaman minorities. At 4 p.m., the pontiff will celebrate the Holy Mass at the Steppe Arena in Ulaanbaatar.

Sept. 4

Pope Francis will meet with charity workers on Monday morning at about 9:30 a.m. and he will inaugurate a charity center called the House of Mercy.

At 11:30 a.m., the pontiff will have a farewell ceremony at "Chinggis Khaan" International Airport and will leave by flight back to Rome around noon.
