Early Voting – Misleading Facts About Issue 1

THE THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME OCTOBER 29, 2023

In the gospel today, Jesus spoke of love as the highest principle in the Jewish Law. Love for God, and love for neighbor. Jesus had been arguing about the resurrection of the dead with the Sadducee (who

denied this belief). When the Pharisees heard Jesus won the argument, they went as a group to Jesus, and one of their experts on the Jewish Law tried to trick Jesus into saying something wrong. "Teacher," the expert said, "What is the most important command in the Jewish Law?"

Jesus answered, "'Love God with all the feeling in your heart, with all the energy within you,' and with every thought in your mind. This is the most important command. The next in importance is just like it. 'Love everyone like you love yourself.'" Jesus answered the question with two commands: Deuteronomy 6:5 (the "Shema") and Leviticus 19:18. Deuteronomy 6:4-6 has defined the faith of the Jews for more than two millennium.

"Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God is one Lord; and you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might. And these words which I command you this day shall be upon your heart."

These verses stress the unity of God and the response of the believer: love for the Creator. Israel based its belief in one God upon freedom. Unlike their neighbors' fertility gods who were guided by seasonal forces of nature, Yahweh was so radically free, even nature could not control him. That freedom made him all-powerful, alive, and ultimately unique among the other notions of the divine. He showed himself almighty through events of his people's history. He freely chose to save a people. He freely chose to make a covenant with them.

Within the context of covenant, the word "love" took on a much fuller sense. God's love meant his concern for his people. Love for God meant a duty of fidelity to Yahweh. So, the focus of love lay more upon duty and action than emotion or romantic ideals. When God loved his people, he showed his power in events recorded in Scripture. When one loved God, he or she lived out the covenant delineated in the Torah.

As God loved his people, his people should love each other. If love for God meant faithful adherence to his covenant, love for neighbor meant acts of charity. When one acts charitably to those in need, one demonstrates love for God. Without charity, worship, scripture study, and prayer become hollow. And, the covenant loses it force. Jesus' answer was conservative and orthodox by the standards of the Pharisees. Lifestyle drew the difference between Jesus and his opponents, however. The Pharisees discussed love as the key for interpretation. Jesus lived out that love. His concern for the poor, the outcast, and the sinner mirrored God's loving concern for his people. The example of Jesus must have stung his opponents deeply. Jesus lived out the Law about which the Pharisees only speculated.

Catechism Theme: The Ten Commandments

The Great Commandment summarizes the Ten Commandments. Love of God means putting him first, respecting His name, and keeping his day. Love of neighbor means respect for others, their relationships, their reputations, and their property.

To love God means a dedication of the entire person to his will. Placing Him first in the mind and the heart. Speaking respectfully about Him. And keeping his day as one of prayer and true recreation, a day to keep his Law. To love neighbor as ourselves means looking at and treating others with the respect God gave them. This love begins at home with one's family. It then extends to others.

We must always remember that the spirit of the Law demands far more than what is written. Love of God lives every waking moment of the day. Love of neighbor extends beyond our family and friends to strangers, especially to the poor, the sick, and the sinner. Love of neighbor knows no national borders or class distinctions or barriers of any kind, because God knows no such impediments.

WEDNESDAY – THE FEAST OF ALL SAINTS

The Solemnity of All Saints is celebrated in honor of all the saints of the Church, whether they are known or unknown. The feast is celebrated on the day before All Souls' Day, which commemorates the faithful departed.



The celebration of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day stems from a belief that there is a powerful spiritual bond between those in heaven (the "Church triumphant"), the living (the "Church militant"), and the "Church penitent" which includes the faithful departed. In Catholic theology, the day commemorates all those who have attained the beatific vision in Heaven.

LITURGICAL FEASTS THIS WEEK

Wednesday, November 1, All Saints Day

First mentioned in the 4th century in the Eastern Churches as the Feast of All Martyrs. Pope Gregory IV transferred the feast from May to November 1.

Thursday, November 2, All Souls Day

Rooted in ancient Christian tradition, Saint Odilo of Cluny established a memorial of all the faithful departed in 988, and it was accepted in Rome in the 13th century. In 1915, Pope Benedict XV granted all priests the privilege of offering three Masses – one for the pope, one for all the departed, and one for a particular intention.

Friday, November 3, Saint Martin de Porres (Religious)

Martin was born in Lima, Peru of a Spanish father and a black slave mother. He was a lay brother who ministered to the poor and the sick. He was a patron of social justice and of peoples of mixed races.

Saturday, November 4, Saint Charles Borromeo (Bishop)

Charles was created a cardinal and secretary of state for his uncle, Pope Pius IV. He implemented the reforms of Trent in his diocese of Milan. He founded seminaries, and was considered a model pastor. In 1584, he died at the age of 46,

- 1.) "Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is also an important daily practice and has become an inexhaustible source of holiness." (Pope John Paul II)
- 2.) "I heartily recommend to the Church's pastors and to the people of God, the practice of Eucharistic adoration, both individually and in community." (Pope Benedict XVI)
- 3.) "Curiously, the prayer of adoration we have lost it. We have lost it, and everyone priests, bishops, consecrated men and women, lay people have to recover it. It's to be in silence, before the Lord." (Pope Francis)

Being Serious About Our Spiritual Destiny

The past three Sundays have featured shocking parables about our readiness to accept and enter the kingdom of God. It is a decision on which your destiny depends. Jesus is not playing around; He lays out the drama in stark and shocking ways in today's Gospel.

"The kingdom of heaven may be likened to a king who gave a wedding feast for his son. He dispatched his servants to summon the invited guests to the feast ...": Of course, the King is the Father and the wedding feast is that of his Son, our Lord Jesus Christ. This is a powerful image of the Kingdom: a wedding feast. Who would not want to come? We may well ask, "If this is heaven, who would not want to go?"

"The text goes on, "... but they refused to come. Some ignored the invitation and went away. Jesus explains their rejection in a twofold way. The things of the world, though not evil in themselves, preoccupy one group. A second group reject the offer out of wickedness: They abuse and kill those who invite them. For many, the kingdom of God is rejected because it is not convenient to their moral life.

"The king was enraged and sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city," the parable continues. This destruction happened to ancient Israel in A.D. 70. After 40 years, the "No" of the invited guests (in this case, the ancient Jews) became definitive and led to their ruin and the end of the Temple. It is the same for us. If we are slow to respond, God repeats his offer again and again. In the end, though, if we don't want to have the Kingdom, we don't have to have it.

Next, "Then he said to his servants, 'The feast is ready, but those who were invited were not worthy to come. When some reject the invitation, God widens the invitation. He wants his Son's wedding feast to be full. When rejected, God just keeps calling.

The text explains, "The servants went out into the streets and gathered all they found, bad and good alike, but there was a man there not dressed in a wedding garment. The king said to him, 'My friend, how is it that you came in here without a wedding garment?' "Bind his hands and feet, and cast him into the darkness outside." Here is a warning, even for those of us who do accept the invitation and enter the Kingdom. The Lord is solemnly urging us to be sober and serious about our spiritual destiny and that of those whom we love.

He Hid Under the Altar



A Tanzanian Bishop Describes Effects of Violent Storm on a Church in his diocese. The bishop called on well-wishers to come to the aid of the people of God in the Tanzanian parish.

St. John Paul II Rwamishenye Church in the Diocese of Bukoba in Tanzania and the parish's rectory have been destroyed following a heavy downpour that was accompanied by strong winds Wednesday

morning, Oct. 18. Speaking to the media after visiting the site, the apostolic administrator of the Bukoba Diocese, Bishop Method Kilaini, recalled the effects of the storm, saying: "The priest was praying in the church. When the church fell, he hid under the altar. This is how he survived."

"Only two people were hit by falling timber," Bishop Kilaini added. "They were taken to the hospital, and their condition is good." The Bishop said the Christians of Rwamishenye Parish "have no place to pray" following the tragedy. "They had built their temporary church and now the structure has been blown away by the wind," Bishop Kilaini lamented.

"Part of the priest's house, a story building, has been unroofed and the wall has fallen," he continued, describing the destruction amid the storm as "a very big problem" for the Rwamishenye parish.

The bishop called on well-wishers to come to the aid of the people of God in the Tanzanian parish. "Anyone who can really help them, let us be with them in this tragedy that has befallen them," he said, encouraging the affected people of God to remain strong amid the tragedy. "Believers should have a great heart. God will help us. Disasters come and God gives us more power. Let's soldier on and do bigger

things than we used to do," Bishop Kilaini said.

Tanzania's Kagera Province has been experiencing heavy rains accompanied by strong winds. On Sunday, Oct. 15, more than 150 houses were unroofed by the strong winds, Muleba District Commissioner Dr. Abel Nyamahanga Said.
