A leper approached Jesus, fell to his knees, and pleaded, "Jesus, if you want to, you can make me whole again." Jesus reached out and touched the man. "He said to him, "I do wish it: Be cleansed." Immediately, the leprosy left him, and he was made clean. The disease the leper had was a serious skin disorder that caused the community to reject him.

The leper recognized Jesus had the power not only to cure him. In the eyes of the leper, Jesus could make him "kosher," ritually clean. Jesus could restore him to an honorable place in society and in Judaism. This leper believed Jesus had a power greater than that of the Temple priest. The priest could act as an official witness that declared a leper cleansed; his role was passive. Jesus, on the other hand, had an active role as he who cured and restored. Since only God had the power to make someone truly clean, the leper recognized God's power in Jesus. Jesus could bring the man back into the community. The man believed that Jesus could do only what God could do: make the man "normal" again.

Jesus cleansed the man: by touching him. To touch the unclean made one unclean. When Jesus touched the diseased man, he "took" the disease upon himself. He changed the status of the "unclean" to "clean" and became polluted. He made himself rejected, so the leper could become accepted. Mark foreshadowed Jesus' ultimate act of accepting death upon Himself, so all might have eternal life with God.

Having clearly warned him, He immediately threw him out. He said to him, "See (that) you do not say anything to anyone. But, go away, show yourself to the priest, and make an offering for your cleansing that Moses commanded, as a witness to them."

Jesus had deep feelings for the man and his condition. Jesus fulfilled the request of the leper, but the cured man did not return the favor. Jesus commanded the cured leper to fulfill the Law. He was to present himself to the priest so he could be declared "clean." In other words, Jesus could cure, but only the priest could declare the man "cleansed". The declaration of the priest would stand as a witness to God's power. Those who opposed Jesus, Sadducee or Pharisee, would have to recognize the effects of the cure. Through the word of Jesus, the unclean was now clean. The cured man, however, did not fulfill Jesus' request. He spread the Good News in other ways, so that it was no longer possible for Jesus to be able to go openly into a town. Jesus could not travel in the open for fear of a mob. Yet, they came to him from every point in Galilee. Jesus continued His ministry despite restrictions placed on him. But he could not visit new territories and preach.

LITURGICAL FEASTS THIS WEEK

Wednesday,	February 14,	Ash Wednesday

The penitential season of lent begins today. It is a day of universal fast and abstinence in the Church. Today, ashes are blessed and imposed as a mark of penance.

Saturday, February 17, The Seven Holy Founders of the Servite Order

The Servites were founded by seven Florentine merchants in 1223. Today the Order numbers 785 members. They popularized devotion to Our Lady of Sorrows.

In what U.S. state is it illegal to dress up as a priest on Halloween?

If you live in the U.S. state of Alabama, you cannot dress like a priest on Halloween or any other day. According to Alabama law, you may be arrested or fined if you dress up as a priest, rabbi, pastor, or any other clergy member of any religion. The state code is clear 'Whoever, being in a public place, fraudulently pretends by garb or outward array to be a minister of any religion, or nun, priest, rabbi, or another member of the clergy, is guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$500.00 or confinement in the county jail for not more than one year, or by both such fine and imprisonment.'

What is Lent?

Wednesday, February 14, 2024 – Thursday, March 28, 2024

Lent is a 40 day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It's a period of preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter. During Lent, we seek the Lord in prayer by reading Sacred Scripture; we serve by giving alms; and we practice self-control through fasting. We are called not only to abstain from luxuries during Lent, but to a true inner conversion of heart as we seek to follow Christ's will more faithfully. We recall the waters of baptism in which we were also baptized into Christ's death, died to sin and evil, and began new life in Christ.

Many know of the tradition of abstaining from meat on Fridays during Lent, but we are also called to practice self-discipline and fast in other ways throughout the season. Contemplate the meaning and origins of the Lenten fasting tradition in this reflection. In addition, the giving of alms is one way to share God's gifts—not only through the distribution of money, but through the sharing of our time and talents. As St. John Chrysostom reminds us: "Not to enable the poor to share in our goods is to steal from them and deprive them of life. The goods we possess are not ours, but theirs." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2446).

In Lent, the baptized are called to renew their baptismal commitment as others prepare to be baptized through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, a period of learning and discernment for individuals who have declared their desire to become Catholics.

Papua New Guinea announces papal visit; Vatican counters visit is 'under study'

Justin Tkatchenko, the foreign minister of Papua New Guinea, announced that the government has received official notice from the Vatican of a three-day papal visit in August. Bishop Anthony Randazzo of Broken Bay (Australia), the president of the Federation of Catholic Bishops Conferences of Oceania, welcomed the news.

In response to the announcement, Matteo Bruni, director of the Holy See Press Office, said that the trip is only "under study," with planning in the "very preliminary" stages.

Pope Francis said in a recent interview that he was considering trips to Argentina and Polynesia this year.

Mourn With Those Who Mourn:

How to Support a Grieving Friend

The main message is simply that you have not forgotten them or the person they love. Earth is the vale of tears. This side of heaven, we will most certainly encounter loss, as will the people around us. When the death of a loved one comes to our own lives, it can leave us frozen in our tracks and unsure of how to proceed. It can be difficult to know what to say to a friend or family member who is suffering from the loss of a loved one.

On the flip side, we experience the ache of when friends or family withheld support because of their own discomfort. Contrary to what one might think, how uncomplicated comforting words could be. Whether sent by a text, written in a card or spoken in person, our words and concern are important in moments of grief.

Grief is many things, but one thing it can be is isolating. Telling a friend that you're uniting your suffering to theirs is a reminder that we are all on the journey together. While we might be afraid to say the wrong thing to a grieving friend, it is far more concerning to say absolutely nothing.

Dear Parishioners,

"Heal the sick!" (Matthew 10:8) Illness was no longer to be seen as a curse, but as a chance for faith, a time for healing. Jesus brought compassion and service to his ministry among the sick. And, as Jesus did, he instructed his followers to do. Hence, the Church has a duty and a charism to act as an agent of God's healing power. In the name of Jesus, the Church prays for healing among the sick. But, by invoking the name, the Church remembers who really heals and serves: God himself.

From Scripture and Tradition, the Church exercises a ministry to the sick. The Anointing of the Sick sums up the Church's ministry: a sign of the community's care and a prayerful anointing for healing. The sacrament, administered by a bishop or priest, binds the sick to Christ. In this sense, the sacrament forgives sin and "raises up" the sick. No matter whether the result of the anointing is physical or spiritual healing, the sacrament points toward the general resurrection, when all the faithful will be made whole, just as Christ's resurrection restored him.

What hope has God given you in times of illness? How have fellow Christians helped you when you were ill? Did their help or prayers help you through the effects of your illness? How?

Mark wrote of healing, ejection, and evangelization. When we feel Christ's healing touch, we want to stay near, to feel intimate union with the Master. Yet, when he withdraws, do we withdraw? Or do we invite others to the Lord?
