THE FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT FEBRUARY 18, 2024

After John baptized Jesus in the Jordan River, Jesus entered the desert to be tempted by the devil. He lived in the desert among wild animals. "He was tempted (for)

forty days in the desert by Satan."

In Mark's short account of the Temptation, he bridged the ministry of John to the ministry of Jesus. The bridge consisted of a test and a proclamation. Jesus was tested for the Kingdom. And he was found worthy to proclaim the Kingdom.

When the spirit realm heard the words "This is my beloved Son," Jesus' contemporaries held, those spirits opposed to God would try to discredit him. After the heavenly announcement, it was time for spiritual battle. God's Spirit drove the Son into the desert so the war could begin. In the mind of Judaism, the desert was the place to find oneself before God and others. The people of God found an identity in the desert. The desert was not a place of escape, but a place of discovery. The desert dweller found him or herself facing "their own demons."

Jesus faced not only Satan, but a hostile environment with wild beasts. This scene stood as stark contrast to the Garden of Eden in Genesis. There, Adam and Eve lived INa plush garden surrounded by obedient animals. Jesus stepped into the Evil One's arena to do battle and justify the title given him by his Father. In Mark's account, Jesus did not face Satan alone. God the Father was present through the service of his angels.

Over past Sundays, we have studied Jesus through the eyes of Mark. One detail became abundantly clear: Jesus possessed power over evil in people (Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Mark 1:21-28) and over evil in nature (Fifth through Seventh Sundays: Mark 1:29-39, 1:40-45, and 2:1-12). In Marks' mind he could not have such power unless Jesus vanquished his foe already. With the test in the desert and the proclamation of the Good News, Jesus proved his victory. Soon the people would echo his victory: "With authority he commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him!" (Mark 1:28 RSV)

The story of Jesus in the desert tempted by the devil is a survival story. Our story this Lenten season is that we can survive in the desert season if we continue to look to Jesus. We have the ability to conquer the wild beasts of our desert: beasts like pride, anger, lust, greed and laziness: untamed animals like fear, worry, discouragement and bitterness: unruly monsters like moody, negative, critical complaining attitudes and acts.

This lent, is the time for serious thinking - a time when Jesus joins us in the desert to pray and do penance with us - to love and forgive us - to wash and cleanse our hearts through the Sacrament of Penance. Jesus tamed the beasts of the desert including Satan. May Jesus handle the beasts of our desert before it this lent.

Carmelite nuns move from New York to Florida



in pursuit of 'silence and solitude'

A religious community of 14 Discalced Carmelite nuns has moved from a busy street in Buffalo, New York, where their order has lived for more than a century, to the Diocese of St. Augustine, Florida, in pursuit of "silence and solitude."

The Discalced Carmelite nuns are a cloistered community dedicated to contemplation and prayer. The sisters take their example from St. Teresa of Avila, the foundress of the Discalced Carmelite order. The Buffalo monastery was less than a half mile away from a busy recreational park and is down the street from a busy intersection. The Monastery was originally established in Buffalo just over 100 years ago when the suburban neighborhood was a quiet area.

The sisters sleep on straw mattresses and engage in much prayer and penance, kneeling on a hard floor in a chapel without pews or chairs to support tired backs or to rest aging knees. The sisters are vegetarians and annually fast from the feast of the Holy Cross on Sept. 14 to Easter. Their fast consists of two light meals for breakfast and dinner with a full meal at midday. And they don't eat eggs or dairy products during Lent. There is silence — essential to the Carmelite life because it enables the sisters to communicate with God continually, without distraction.

Catechism Theme: Jesus' Temptation and the Proclamation of the Kingdom

Christ in the desert revealed the new Adam, the One who would vanquish the Tempter. Unlike Adam (and, later, the Israelites in the desert), Jesus did not fall to whims of selfish ambition. No, Jesus remained the faithful Son. And in his fidelity, he claimed victory over Satan. He also foreshadowed his obedient acceptance of the cross.

His fidelity was not only pointed toward his Father. When he answered "NO!" to Satan, he answered "YES!" for us. He would be a faithful servant to us. We who turn away from God find ourselves pursued and served by God in the person of Jesus. When we become his followers, his "NO!" becomes our rejection of evil. His "YES!" becomes our battle cry of hope for the Father.

With His victory over evil, Christ can now proclaim the coming of the Kingdom, for he can announce that which he possesses. When we are bonded to Him (and each other) we can taste the Kingdom. As He was lifted up in obedience on the cross, we are lifted up with him, so we can share in the relationship of the Father and the Son, the very essence of the Kingdom.

Reopening of Notre-Dame de Paris to be marked by six months of celebration and praise

Archbishop Laurent Ulrich of Paris has announced plans for a prolonged celebration of the reopening of Notre Dame Cathedral, the iconic church in the French capital that was nearly destroyed by a blaze in 2019.

The archbishop released a new pastoral letter on February 2 called "The year 2024 in the Archdiocese of Paris" with a precise schedule of ceremonies surrounding the cathedral's planned reopening next December. The special events will begin on December 8, 2024 and run until June 8, 2025, the Solemnity of Pentecost. Everything gets underway about 15 days before the reopening, actually, when the cathedral's statue of Our Lady, which is E currently at Saint-Germain-l'Auxerrois, will be transported back to Notre-Dame de Paris in a "large procession"



Dear Parishioners,

We have entered the Holy Penitential Season of Lent. This season of Lent recalls the forty years spent by the Israelites in the desert while on their way to the Promised Land. During that time, the Israelite people experienced what it meant to live in tents without a fixed home to live in. They were often tempted to return to Egypt, where at least there was a supply of bread even though it was the food of slaves. In the wilderness of the Sinai desert, God Himself provided water and food for His people. He protected them from every danger. For the Hebrews, the experience of being totally dependent on God became their path to freedom from slavery.

The Lenten season is meant to help each of us through a commitment to personal purification, to relive the same spiritual journey. The arrival of Lent is not something to dread, but rather, it is something to celebrate. It is a wonderful opportunity for each of us to do some "spiritual house-keeping and growth."

There are things about each of us that need to change; we know it deep down in our hearts and yet we resist God's grace which quietly invites each of us to growth. Even though we know that we are often in a spiritual rut, we become comfortable in our lifestyles. Jesus challenges us from the desert to let go of any way of thinking or acting which keeps us from full communication with God and one another.

Attack on priest in Jerusalem brings intolerance of Christians back into focus



Violence against Christians in Jerusalem continues to make the news following an incident on Feb. 3 when Father Nikodemus Schnabel, the abbot of the Benedictine Abbey of the Dormition, was attacked by two young Jewish nationalists.

The incident occurred near the Zion Gate on the border between the Armenian and Jewish quarters. A minor and an individual approximately 20 years old spat on the priest and verbally attacked him, shouting insults against Jesus. "Normally, I am used to the fact that people spit on me — this is a very daily experience, especially at Mount Zion where the Dormition Abbey is located," Schnabel said a few days after the incident. The abbey is located in a Jewish neighborhood with a significant presence of religious schools and ultra-Orthodox Jews, who do not tolerate the presence of Christians.

The monks of the Dormition are often under attack. In late December, the inscription "Christian missionaries are worse than Hamas" appeared on the wall of the Orthodox cemetery in front of the abbey. Frequently, during the night, the monastery is targeted with stones. The Benedictine Abbey of the Dormition in Jerusalem stands on Mount Zion and has been a part of Jerusalem's skyline for more than a century.

These attacks occur in other hot spots in the city such as the Armenian quarter and the Via Dolorosa, where the streets of Jewish and Christian neighborhoods intersect. The incidents happen more often than the public and the media know because it is not always possible to document them, and many clergy, religious people — but also foreigners and Christian faithful are not as likely to report them.

The phenomenon of the harassment of Christians in the Holy Land is not something new. The Rossing Center has recently launched a monitoring program for these incidents, noting an increase in cases in the last couple of years. There are dozens of confirmed cases with evidence supporting them. The episodes range from harassment such as insults and spitting to outright acts of violence toward Church property, the desecration of cemeteries, and physical threats.

The attackers are usually men, mainly teenagers to late 20s. All of them come from a religious background: either from the ultra-Orthodox world or from an ultra-nationalist and religious movement, which is a more extreme version of the traditional national religious society.

In recent months, the phenomenon of assaults against Christians has ramped up. "We need to go through an educational process in order to change the mentality. If the majority of people publicly condemn these actions, gradually an atmosphere of delegitimization can be created. Perhaps individuals will think twice before spitting or making offensive remarks. It is essential to promote the idea in the country that these are unacceptable behaviors," the priest said.

2024 Lenten Message to the Faithful of the Diocese of Steubenville

The 40-day Season of Lent is upon us, and as is the case every year, it provides us with an opportunity to reflect upon our lives. On Ash Wednesday, when we hear the words "Remember that you are dust, and unto dust you shall return," we are reminded that we are mortal human beings whose lives in this world are finite. When we hear the words "turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel," we are encouraged once more to change what needs to be changed about how we are living our lives. In addition, we are encouraged to take the opportunity of these six weeks to grow in love for God and neighbor through the three-fold spiritual practices of prayer, almsgiving (acts of charity), and fasting. As Pope Francis reminds us in his 2024 Lenten Message: & quote; Prayer, almsgiving and fasting are not three unrelated acts, but a single movement of openness and self-emptying & quote; What we want to empty ourselves of is sin and selfishness; what we want to open ourselves to is to live virtuous, compassionate and merciful lives.

We are all keenly aware that our world is in crisis from many different ways of looking at our current reality. There is a sense of divisiveness among world nations; as Pope Francis has said: & quote; we are experiencing a third world war being fought piecemeal." We find that same sense of divisiveness, often accompanied by violence, in the political, social, and familial realms of our lives. While there may be many causes for this lack of unity and animosity of spirit, one undeniable cause is the impact of sin, and a lack of Faith in God. Some people are predicting dire consequences facing the future of humanity. However, the Season of Lent gives us all an opportunity to take what some see as a time of death and destruction, and turn it into a season of Hope and new Life: in God our Father Who loves all of humanity, in Jesus Who has come to save the world from the ultimate power of sin and death, and in the Holy Spirit Who guides us in the ways that will lead us to Eternal Life.

I urge everyone in our beloved Local Church of the Diocese of Steubenville to enter into this Season of Lent with the intention of remembering that while the mortality of our bodies means that our lives in this world are limited, the immortality of our souls means that we will live forever. Let us be determined to avail ourselves of the Sacrament of Penance (making good Confessions on a regular basis), and to spend quality time in prayer, almsgiving (acts of charity) and fasting, so that we can turn away from sin, embrace a life of Virtue, and live our lives in ways that will result in bringing greater unity to our relationships, and that will give glory to God in how we live our lives here and now, and when our lives in this world are completed.
